



Please deliver following message to Prime Minister:

QTE June 13, 1958

Dear Mr. Prime Minister:

I am, of course, aware that our governments have been in communication concerning recent Cyprus developments, including the current violence on the Island. In view of my great concern over the possible consequences of a failure to bring about a peaceful solution to this problem, and one which will not disrupt the very foundations of western defense to which both of our countries have made such a great contribution, I would like to share with you personally my own apprehensions.

The United States is not directly a party to the dispute, although we have endeavored to be of assistance to our friends in bringing about amicable settlement. I believe that such a settlement is both possible and desirable.

Yet there is no sign of a convulsion after the manner of Hungary. And it would be a mistake to overlook one factor of stability: the astonishing economic progress of the past eighteen months. China, which made possible the victory of Dien Bien Phu, is paying for much of the economic progress, too, much as the Americans are financing recovery in the south. And the progress is real even though some of its aspects—such as the building of railways from China into Tongking, which gives the Chinese a long-sought outlet to the port of Haiphong—are directly profitable to the donors. A match factory has been built, and a new power station has been completed at Thanh Hoa with Russian assistance. Coal, tin and textile production have risen, though not yet to prewar levels. But the most striking progress is in rice production. Last year, a Russian gift of Burmese rice staved off famine; today there is a surplus and the Indian government has been offered up to 50,000 tons. True, the south is planning to export 250,000 tons next year; but the north, unlike the south, is traditionally a deficit area. This is the measure of the stringency of the "race for viability" between the two zones.

In this connection it is proper to state that Captain Shartle is personally acquainted with Scheekat Pasha, the Turkish Minister of War, and Enver Bey, the Turkish military attache at Berlin, and the latter has voluntarily offered to recommend to his Government favorable action in case it is desired to send Captain Shartle for that duty.

U. S. AMBASSADOR OFFERS TO RAISE MONEY TO BRING ARMENIAN PEOPLE TO U. S.

Morgenthau's Plan to Remove Whole Race Accepted by Turks--
Will Cost Probably \$5,000,000--Washington Asked to Name Committee.

By John Reed. A special Correspondent of the Post-Dispatch and the New York World.

Sofia, Sept. 15, Smuggled from Constantinople Sept. 7th.

Ambassador Morgenthau has made an offer to the Turkish Government to raise \$1,000,000 to transport the survivors of the Armenian people to America. He has called Washington asking that a commission of prominent Americans be appointed by the President to handle the matter and suggests five names, he won't tell who.

The Turkish Government accepted the offer Sept. 2, but Washington has not answered. In an interview Ambassador Morgenthau said:

"The United States might be the Moses to lead the Armenian people out of bondage. They could be put in the unsettled region of the Western states, in parts of Washington, Eastern Oregon, Idaho, Nevada and California. They are a clean, industrious, intelligent race, the best class for immigrants, farmers and laborers, eager for education.

Two or three weeks ago I approached Enver Pasha and Talaat Bey (The Turkish Ministers of War and of the Interior and two virtual rulers of Turkey today) and suggested that if the wholesale deportation of the Armenians was merely a military measure, perhaps they would not object to their deportation to America. They finally acquiesced.

500,000 Need Help.

"By investigation I discovered that a million is not enough. Five hundred thousand Armenians need help -- 110,000 in Constantinople alone. A hundred dollars a head is needed to equip and transport them.

"It is a magnificent opportunity for America to save an entire race and get a fine element of citizenship. I suggest that the states needing settlers each raise a fund to equip a ship for Asia Minor. Perhaps \$5,000,000 will be the needed total."

In the Armenian oppression by the Turkish Government since April, it is conservatively estimated that from 300,000 to 700,000 are dead from massacres, starvation and disease.



President Kemal Atatürk died at Istanbul on November 10. Since 1919, when he took command of the Turkish forces in Asia Minor and led the National movement, the history of Turkey has been the story of his life. He was born at Salonica in 1881, the son of a contractor and an Albanian mother. Educated as a soldier, he distinguished himself in various campaigns, especially during the Great War, in the defence of the Dardanelles, and afterwards by the reform of the army. In 1922 the Grand National Assembly established the


President and "Chief of the State." In 1924 the Caliphate was abolished, and, taking as a basis, he turned to the secularisation of his country. Drastic changes in social life, dress, education, and the abolition of the Sultanate for the Arabi al-Muhammed, transformed Turkey into a European nation. A foreign policy he maintained the understanding with Russia, and cultivating friendly relations with Britain. In 1925, with M. Yildirim, he



CEMENTING AN OLD FRIENDSHIP: KEMAL ATATURK WELCOMES EDWARD VIII.

ATATURK, entering the capital in the course of his holiday visit to the "Nahlin," King Edward sailed up the Dardanelles, the Gallipoli peninsula at Sidi-e-Bahr, when, in 1912, Allied forces landed at the beginning of the Gallipoli campaign. His Majesty visited the principal cemeteries and battlefields on the eastern part of Gallipoli, accompanied by the Imperial War Graves Assistant Commissioner and General Saïreddin. Elaborate preparations were made for the King's visit to Constantinople. Mosques and minarets were hoisted, and traffic was largely diverted to back streets. King Edward landed at the Yuliana Quay shortly after noon on September 4. Kemal Atatürk, President of the Turkish Republic, personally handed him ashore. After shaking hands with the British Ambassador, the King entered the President's car and drove to the British Embassy. Later he visited the President at the Dolmabahçe Summer Palace on the Bosphorus, and then saw over the Old Seraglio Palace. After a day spent visiting the sights of the city and on the Bosphorus, he left for Vienna in the special train put at his disposal by the Turkish President.
