In view of my great concern over the possible consequences of a failure to bring about a peaceful solution to this problem, and one which will not disrupt the very foundations of western defense to which both of our countries have made such a great contribution, I would like to share with you personally my own apprehensions. Yet there is no sign of a convulsion after the manner of Hungary. And it would be a mistake to overlook one factor of stability: the astonishing economic progress of the past eighteen months. China, which made possible the victory of Dien Bien Phu, is paying for much of the economic progress, too, much as the Americans are financing recovery in the south. And the progress is real even though some of its aspects-such as the building of railways from China into Tongking, which gives the Chinese a long-sought outlet to the port of Haiphong-are directly profitable to the donors. A march factory has been built, and a new power station has been completed at Tanh Hoa with Russian assistance. Coal, tin and textile production have risen, though not yet to prewar levels. But the most striking progress is in rice production. Last year, a Russian gift of Burmese rice staved off famine; today there is a surplus and the Indian government has been offered up to 50,000 tons. True, the south is planning to export 250,000 tons next year; but the north, unlike the south, is traditionally a deficit area. This is the measure of the stringency of the "race for viability " between the two zones.

For the tragedy that has stricken the Turkish delegation to the Cyprus conference there is consolation not only in the preservation of its leader but also in the good will that has flowed to Mr. MENDERES from all sides. This personal sympathy was deepened by reports last night of difficulties at a lower level of negotiation. It would indeed be a grievous disappointment if, on his recovery, he found hazards still besetting the agreement he hopes to seal with his Greek and British colleagues. 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



The first formal sitting of the Turkish-Greek conference was held this morning. and lasted for nearly three-and-a-half hours. Apart from the statement that the atmosphere was cordial, nothing was made known about the discussions. They were resumed this evening. After a sitting lasting two hours it was announced that the two Foreign Ministers would meet in the morning to examine "certain points" and that the Prime Ministers would join them at mid-

day to consider the outcome.

On the Turkish side they were attended by Mr. Menders, the Prime Minister, Mr. Zorlu, the Foreign Minister, and Mr. M. Escabel secretary.

I have the honor to state that it is desired by the War Department to send an officer to witness the autumn maneuvers of the Turkish Army in October next, and to request that, if practicable and convenient, the American Ambassador at Constantinople be instructed to take the proper steps to obtain permission from the Turkish Government for Captain Samuel G. Shartle, Coast Artillery Corps, Military Attache, American Embassy, Berlin, Germany, to witness the maneuvers in question.

In this connection it is proper to state that Captain Shartle is personally acquainted with Schefkat Pasha, the Turkish Minister of War, and Enver Bey, the Turkish military attache at Berlin, and the latter has voluntarily offered to recommend to his Government favorable action in case it is desired to send Captain Shartle for that duty.

U. S. AMBASSADOR OFFERS TO RAISE MONEY TO BRING ARMENIAN PROPLE TO U. S.

Morgenthau's Plan to Remove Whole Race Accepted by Turks--Will Cost Probably \$5,000,000--Washington Asked to Name Committee.

Sofia, Sept. 15. Smuggled from Constantinople Sept. 7th.

Ambassador Morgenthau has made an offer to the Turkish Government to raise \$1,000,000 to transport the survivors of the Armenian people to America. He has called Washington asking that a commission of prominent Americans be appointed by the President to handle the matter and suggests five names, he won't tell who.

The Turkish Government accepted the offer Sept. 2. but Washington has not answered. In an interview Ambassador

Morgenthau said:

The United States might be the Moses to lead the Armanian people out of bondage. They could be put in the unsettled region of the Western states, in parts of Washington, Eastern Oregon, Idaho, Nevada and California. They are a clean, industrious, intelligent race, the best class for immigrants, farmers and laborers, sugar for education

Two or three weeks ago I approached Enver Pasha and Tablet Bey (The Turkish Ministers of War and of the Interior and two virtual rulers of Turkey today) and suggested that if the wholesale deportation of the Armenians was merely a military measure, perhaps they would not object to their deportation to America. They finally acquiesced.

"By investigation I discovered that a million is not enough. Five hundred thousand Armenians need help -- 110,000 in Constantinople alone. A hundred dollars a head is needed to equip and transport them.

"It is a magnificent opportunity for America to save an entire race and get a fine element of citizenship. I suggest that the states needing settlers each raise a fund to equip a ship for Asia Minor. Perhaps \$5,000,000 will be the needed total."

In the Armenian oppression by the Turkish Government since April, it is conservatively estimated that from 300,000 to 700,000 are dead from massacres, starvation and disease.
